IUNE 9, at 6 p. m., 1890, until WEDNESDAY,
JULY 9, 1890.

The owners allowing dogs to run at large, unless muzzled, will be liable to the fine under Section 2 of the Ordinance of 1841.

The fine imposed by the Ordinance of 1827, Sec. 2, will be inflicted upon any person obstructing the legally employed persons from carrying out the ordinances respecting the capturing of dogs during the continuance of this proclamation. June3-3id ROBERT CLARK, Mayor.

MAYOR'S PROCLAMATION — AT THIS season of the year it is of the utmost importance that the following ordinance should be strictly observed:

That "every person or persons who shall possess or inhabit the front shop, house or building adjoining to or fronting the foot pavement or foot ways within the city shall cause the same along the front of their shops, houses, building or property to be swept, scraped or cleaned at least on the Saturday of each week before 10 o'clock in the morning, and shall sho for the same distance keep the gutters open and clean."
