SIXTY MEN IDLE.

PUDDLERS' HELPERS AT THE SUSQUEHANNA MILL REFUSE TO WORK.

They Make Demand For Scale Gatherers. Statements Made By Both the Strikers and the Company's Managers.

Columbia, June 7.—A strike is now in progress at the Susquehama rolling mill among the helpers to the puddlers. The facts concerning the causes which led to the trouble between the management and workmen are as follows: The Columbia Iron company have been allowing what are tormed scale gatherers. In rolling mills this work is usually performed by the puddlers' helpers, this understanding being in force at the Columbia rolling mill. Last week a committee asked for scale gatherers at the Susquehama rolling mill, and were told that an answer would be given them on Tuesday, the Shinst, the foreman of the the mill, Mr. Brady, going to Buffalo in the meantime. A second committee waited on Secretary Schall last evening, when they were again told that an answer would be given on Tuesday. They left expressing themselves as satisfied. This morning when the furnaces were to be charged the helpers advised the watchman that they would not go to work until the question is settled. This move, although it will not prevent the mill from running indefinitely in the finishing department, shuts down the puddling department, shuts down the puddling department and sixty men are out of employment. The management claim that the employment of scale gatherers is directly against the interests of the puddlers, as partiality is more likely to be shown by weight being credited where it does not belong. The only claims the helpers make are that the Columbia Iron company provide scale gatherers and that an answer was promised columbia from company provide scale gatherers and that an answer was promised on Saturday night. The former is correct and the mill people cannot speak for Foreman Brady, who is absent, any more than to say that he was instructed to tell the committee that an answer would be given by Tuesday.
