We have always deprecated these overgrown monopolies, whether in business or railroad travelling, and we think the time has arrived when a barrier should be interposed by the proper authority, to prevent their encroachments on the rights of the people.

A Ruined Country.

While the legislative peculators, calling them selves "protectionists," says the Washington Union, are contriving to figure out the conclusion that the country has been ruined by the tariff of 1846, the Banks of Boston have contrived to figure a considerable amount of cash into the pockets of their stockholders. It appears by the last statement of the semi-annual dividends, that of the 27 Banks, of that City, 2 have divided among their stockholders 5 per cent.; 2,44 per cent.; and 9, 34 per cent. The average is but a small fraction less than 4 per cent-And all this business has been done and this money made, while the masquerade noblemen at Newpor R. L. and the "high tariff" politicians of Pennsylvania, dressed in French broadcloth, French boots and French gloves, have been clamoring for the interests of labor, and manufacturing ruin for the country. But, in spite of the scheming and selfish devices of the fictitious nobility, the country has never been more prosperous than it is now, and the people are well satisfied with things as they are, if we may judge from the result of the recent elec tions in Pennsylvania and other States of the Union.
