### Buried Alive.

The St. Louis Union of the 7th inst., gives the following case of burying alive: On Friday last, a funeral train arrived at the grave yard, bearing with them for burial, the corpse a German, who was supposed to have died from e effects of laudanum. It appears the man had the effects of laudanum. It appears the man had been unwell and laboring under great pain. To ease this, his brother procured a phial of lauda-num, a part of which was administered to the afflicted man, and the phial and remainder were put away. After having slept some time, and while the rest

of the family were asleep, the sick man awoke, hunted up the laudanum, and drank the whole of it, which so nearly deprived him of life that his relatives concluded he was dead. He was taken to the grave yard for burial, the grave dug, the coffin owered into it, the grave partially filled, the mourners started for their homes, and the sexton left his son to complete the filling of the grave, while he went to attend to another, in a different part of the disappeared, nor have I seen it since in any fields,

The son had been engaged but a short time in throwing dirt into the grave, when he heard a noise resembling heavy breathing, which appeared to proceed from the coffin he was burying. The boy called his father, who quickly unearthed the coffin, opened it, and found the man had turned his head as partially to lay on the front of his face, and the body was warm. He procured vinegar, &c., and made great exertion to recover him, but his efforts came too late, the man was dead.


