> That the doctrines and principles of the Demoracy, as asserted by the National Democratic Conventions which assembled at Baltimore in May, 1844, and May, 1848, we still warmly recognize and support, and pledge ourselves, as representa-tives of the democracy of Pennsylvania, not to

yield or give up any portion of that broad constitutional platform covering the entire extent of the Union; which is as follows:

2. That the constitution does not confer upon general government the power to commence

and carry on a general system of internal impro-3. That the constitution does not confer authority upon the federal government, directly or indirectly, to assume the debts of the several States, contracted for local internal improvements, or other State purposes; nor would such assumption be just and expedient.

4. That justice and sound policy forbid the feral government to foster one branch of industry o the detriment of another, or to cherish the inerests of one portion to the injury of another portion of our common country; that every citizen, and every section of the country, has a right to demand and insist on an equality of rights and privileges, and to complete an ample protection of ersons and property, from domest

oreign transgre 5. That it is the duty of every branch of the government to enforce and practice the most rigid economy in conducting our public affairs, and that no more revenue ought to be raised than is required to defray the necessary expenses of the government, and for the gradual but certain ex-tinction of the debt created by the prosecution of a

just and necessary war.
6. That Congress has no power to charter s national bank; that we believe such an institution one of deadly hostility to the best interests of the-
