The Lancaster County Prison was not completed until the close of August last. At the August term of the Court of Quarter Session, for 1851, the Grand Jury, on the 23rd day of August, decreed, according to the provisions of the Ilth section of the Act of 19th February. 1850, that the Lancaster County Prison was fitted and prepared to receive convicts and other prisoners," after which the Prison was taken possession of by the Board of Inspectors, and put under the keeperahip of Jacob Foltz. Esq., and the furnishing of the Cells and making the needful preparations for the reception of inmates made in as speedy a manner as circumstances would admit.

On the 12th September, 1851, the first prisoners were received into the Prison, and a new cra was begun in the treatment of criminals and the punishing of offenders in Lancaster county, which the Board confidently believe, will do honor to the humanity of the County.

But the Board soon discovered that the Prison was not in many material parts as properly constructed and completed as to answer the ends contemplated, and many changes and alterations had to be made.

The aparatus put into the building by the County and the analysis of the County in the county of the prisoners, that other and practicable arrangements be immediately undertaken. This the Board did at considerable expense. The necessity for this heavy expenditure upon a building that should have been in so very material a part, at first perfect they very much reget.
