

The Three Hundred Dollar Law Act

The following very important opinion as to the construction of the Act of 1849, known as the "Three Hundred Dollar Law Act, which shortly reverses the practice upon it, was read a short time since by his Honor, Chief Justice Black, of the Supreme Court:

Hammer vs. Freeman. In the Northern District Appeal from the Court of Northern Districts the plaintiff's personal property was levied on and sold. The proceeds amounted to \$454 11. The defendant in the execution was present when the levy was made, but did not claim that any of the goods were exempt from the sale, however, he demanded the benefit of the Statute. The Sheriff sold the property and paid the proceeds into Court, and the Court, on Fress's petition, ordered \$300 of the money to be paid to him.
