

Foreign News.

Boston, August 31.—The steamer Europe arrived here this morning from Halifax. The following items are in addition to the dispatch forwarded from Halifax.

France.—The Emperor of France had relinquished his contemplated journey to Dieppe. A new expedition to the Eastern question was assigned as the reason.

Austria.—It was rumored at Vienna, should Russia make an irroad into Serbia, Austria would occupy the fortress of Belgrade.

Spain and Turkey.—The latest intelligence from St. Petersburg states that, notwithstanding the negotiations for peace, the war department was as active as ever.

The acceptance of the Vienna proposition was not unconditional. He will not consent to evacuate the Principality until the Porte has signed an arrangement tantamount to the concession of all the points in dispute.

The Porte will not send off an Ambassador until the order to withdraw is sent by the Russian troops. The Car will not send that order till the Porte has signed an arrangement which is tantamount to a concession of every point in dispute, and having got to this point, he is permitted to send an Envoy to St. Petersburg, to discuss two questions:—the indemnification of expenses, and the expulsion of all political refugees.

The former will be waived, but as to the latter, though little has been said on the point, as yet Russia will profit by this opportunity of leaving Turkey at a disadvantage, and as a measure which the firmness of the Porte refused to or three years back, and Austria will gladly join in enforcing the present arrangement.

Advice on Constantinople to the 5th, state that the Persian Ambassador had given the Sultan full assurances of assistance if wanted, measures having been taken by the Shah to raise 60,000 men to be placed at the disposal of the Sultan.

The Turkish Government has ordered the Greek Bishops to return to their Bishoprics immediately, it having been ascertained that Russian Agents were fomenting disorders in various parts of the country.

The Ecclesiastics will to a certain extent, be made responsible for the tranquility of their respective districts.

When the news reached Serbia of the threatened occupation of that territory by the Austrian troops, the Prince of Serbia, who would resist the occupation by force. The whole province was armed, and 30,000 militia were already collected.

The latest information from Constantinople, by telegraph, states the people continued to favor retention.

SHORT BY A SNAKE.—A strange occurrence recently took place near Shepherds town, Cumberland county, this State, in which a man was shot by a snake. A gentleman by the name of Louman, store keeper in Siddonsburg, York county, was out gunning, he discovered a snake in the woods, and he went to secure it from running away, he placed a butt of his rifle, loaded with a ball at the time upon the body of the snake, with his hand directly upon the muzzle. The snake in writing to free itself from the muzzle of the gun, and with its coils struck the hammer which was down upon the cap at the time hard enough to discharge the gun, the contents of which entered the ball of the hand near the wrist, and in a diagonal direction into the arm, and he was severely injured, and the one next to it, namely no bones being broken. A few moments delay in the discharge of the gun might have cost him his life. The whole circumstance is a very singular one.
