As a natural cosequence of the greatly increased probbailities of a general European war, English Stock and Breadstuff markets have been greatly

excited and Consols closed on Friday at a decline The Breadstuff Markets throughout Great Britain has been more excited than at any previous time since the famine in Ireland, and prices had largely advanced.

Of these 61, 20 are convicts; 2 committed for fine and costs: 18 awaiting trial; and 12 vagrants, &c. Of the 470 received during the year, 47 were convicted.

The tables hereto annexed furnish in detail much interesting information relative to the prisoners during the past year. The whole number committed to the Prison during the year 1853, excepting the 47 sentenced, was 423—of which 180 were for Drunkenness, 33 Vagrancy, and 9 for drunken and disorderly conduct; as per table No. 1. In addition to which there were sentenced, during the same period, 47, and remaining in Prison on the 31st of Dec. 1852, 46—making the above total in Prison, in 1853, 516; as per table No. 2. Table No. 3 shows how the 455 discharged prifoners were disposed of. Table No. 4 will show the various charges upon which the 47 convicts were sentenced. Table No. 5 their term of sentence, with the color and sex of each. By this table it appears that of the 47, but 22 were born in Lancaster City and co, and 11 in Germany. Table No. 7 their ages. About two-thirds of the whole number, viz: 31, were under the age of thirty years. Table No. 8 how often they have been convicted. Table No. 9, showing the occupations of the prisoners prior to their conviction—exhibiting the large proportion of 30 in the 47 who year without trades. Table No. 10 shows the number that can read and write—more than half the number of medical cases treated. Compared with the previous year, there were 11 less received in 1833 than in 1852, and 16 more remaining in Prison at the close of the former than at the close of the latter year.

The general health of the prisoners during the past year has been good. The number of cases treated was but 94—that of the previous year 102. The mass of these 94 cases came into the Prison in a disordered and diseased condition, resulting from the dissipation and irregularity of their lives. One prisoner died of Mania a Potu. For details on this subject see Table No. 13, containing Physician's Report. There were no cases of insanity developed in the Prison during the past year.

The Inspectors in their last Annual Report, had occa sion to deplore the unusally large number of Vagrants, "housed, warmed and fed at the public expense," during the previous year, as peculiarly burdensome and expensive. This cause of complaint, although not entirely removed, has greatly abated during the past year, as will be seen by reference to table No. 1—by which it appears there were confined in that period but 33 Vagrants and 9 drunken and disorderly persons; which contrasted with the 87 of the previous year, shows a reduction in the past year of more than one half of that of the former year. This decrease in Vagrancy, the Inspectors believe, is attributable to the beneficial operation of the 5th section of the Act of Assembly of March 31, 1833, by which it is provided, "That any person or persons who may be convicted under existing laws, before the Mayor or any Alderman of the City of Lancaster, or any Justice of the Peace of Lancaster County, as a Vagrant, drunken or disorderly persons, shall, for the first offence, be sentenced to confinement at hard laboy, affording a sufficient length of continement at hard laboy, affording a sufficient length of continement at hard laboy, affording a sufficient length of continem

This is \$431 02 less than the average of the previous year. This sum, the Inspectors have every reason to be lieve, will hereafter be annually further diminished. Statement P shows the amount paid to convicts and prisoners for over work, to wit; \$170 67.

Statements S, T, U, v and W, whow the progress made in manufacturing in the Prison during the year. It appears by these statements, that there were made 7.797 yes of Carpet for customers; 10,334 yds do for sale; 9120 yds Lancaster County Stripe; 200 yds Lancaster County Stripe; 200 yds Lancaster County Stripe; 200 yds Lancaster County Obeck; 530 pairs of Boots and Shose; 49 Fishing Spis; 3,054½ yds of Bagging; 27 doz Bagg; 46,550 Sale; 42,600 Skivers, and sundry other articles.

These statements compare favorably with the corresponding statements of our last Annual Report, and show a large increase, during the year, in all the branches of manufacturing, which, they doubt not, will continue increasing annually, until, as they predicted in their last Annual Report, "the products of the manufacturing industry of the prisoners will yield revenue proximately sufficient to defray the expenses." While there has been such a large increase in the quantity manufactured, there is a notes marked improvement in quality and style. The fabrics of the Lancaster County Prison, especially in the articles of Carpets and Stripes, will not suffer in comparison with the similar fabrics of regular manufactories. Much of the credit of the management of the Prison, during the period embraced in this Report, is due to the care and attention exercised by the Keeper and his assistants in the performance of their duties.
