When, more recently, it became requisite to organize the Territories of Nebraska and Kanas, it was the natural and legitimate, if not the inevitable consequence of previous events and legislation, that the same great and sound principle, which had already been applied to Utah and New Mexico, should be applied to them; that they should stand exempt from the restrictions proposed in the act relative to the State of Missouri.

These restrictions were, in the estimation of many thoughtful men, null from the beginning, unauthorized by the constitution, contrary to treaty stipulations for the cession of Louis iana, and inconsistent with the equality of the

They had been stripped of all moral au-thority, by persistent efforts to procure their indirect appeal through contradictory enact-They had been practically abrogated by the legislation attending the organization of Utah, New Mexico, and Washington. If any vitality remained in them, it would have been taken away, in effect, by the new territorial acts, in the form originally proposed to the Senate at the first session of the last Congress. It was manly and ingenuous, as well as patriotic and just, to do this directly and plainly, and thus relieve the statute-book of an act which might be of possible future injury, but of no possible future benefit; and the measure of its repeal was the final consummation and complete recognition of the principle, that no portion of the United States shall undertake hrough assumption of the powers of the general rovernment, to dictate the social institutions of any other portion. The scope and effect of the language of re-

peal were not left in doubt. It was declared in terms, to be "the great intent and meaning of this act not to legislate slavery into any Territory or State, nor to exclude it therefrom, but to leave the people thereof perfectly free to form and regulate their domestic institutions in their own way, subject only to the constitution of the United States."

The measure could not be withstood upon its merits alone. It was attacked with violence on the false or delusive pretext, that it constituted a breach of faith. Never was objection When, before, was it imagined by sens ble men, that a regulative or declarative stat-ute, whether enacted ten or forty years ago, is irrepealable,—that an act of Congress is above the constitution? If, indeed, there were in the facts any cause to impute bad faith, it would attach to those only, who have never ceased from the time of the enactment of the restrictive provision to the present day, to denounce and to condemn it : who have constantly refused to complete it by needful supplenentary legislation; who have spared no exertion to deprive it of moral force; who have selves again and again attempted its repeal by the enactment of incomprehensible provisions; and who, by the inevitable reac-ionary effect of their own violence on the subject, awakened the country to perception of the true constitutional principle, of leaving the matter involved to the discretion of the people of the respective existing or incipient States.
It is not pretended that this principle, or any other, precludes the possibility of evils in practice, disturbed as political action is liable to be by human passions. No form of governent is exempt from inconveniences; this case they are the result of the abuse, and not of the legitimate exercise, of the powers served or conferred in the organization of a Territory. They are not to be charged to the great principle of popular sovereignty; on the contrary, they disappear before the intelligence and patriotism of the people, exerting through the ballot-box their peaceful and silent but ir,

esistible power. If the friends of the constitution are to have another struggle, its enemies could not present a more acceptable issue, than that of a State whose constitution clearly embraces "a repub lican form of government," being excluded from the Union because its domestic institutions may not in all respects compart with the ideas of what is wise and expedient entertained in some other State. Fresh from groundless imputations of breach of faith against others men will commence the agitation of this new question with indubitable violation of an express compact between the independent soy reign powers of the United States and of the Republic of Texas, as well as of the older and equally solemn compacts, which assure the equality of all the States.

But, deplorable as would be such a violation

nvolved. When sectional agitators shall have acceeded in forcing on this issue, can their pretensions fail to be met by counter preten ions? Will not different States be compelled respectively to meet extremes with extrem And, if either extreme carry its point, what hat so far forth but dissolution of the Union a new State, formed from the territory the United States, be absolutely excluded from ulmission therein, that fact of itself constitutes the disruption of union between it and the other States. But the process of dissolu-tion could not stop there. Would not a section could not stop there. Would not a sec-tional decision, producing such result by a majority of votes, either Northern or Souther necessity drive out the oppressed and aggrieved minority, and place in presence of each

It is necessary to speak thus plainly of projects, the offspring of that sectional agitation now prevailing in some of the States, which are as impracticable as they are unconstitutiona and which, if persevered in, must and will end It is either disunion and civil war, or it is mere angry, idle, aimless disturbance of public peace and tranquility. Dis-union for what? If the passionate rage of fanaticism and partisan spirit did not force the fact upon our attention, it would be difficult to believe, that any considerable portion of the people of this calightened country could have so surrendered themselves to a fanatical devo-tion to the supposed interests of the relatively few Africans in the United States, as totally to bandon and disregard the interests of the twenty-five millions of Americans,-to trample under foot the injunctions of moral and constitutional obligation,—and to engage in plans of vindictive hostility against, those who are ssociated with them in the enjoyment of the Nor is it hostility against their fellow citizens o one section of the Union alone. The nterests, the honor, the duty, the peace, and the prosperity of the people of all sections are

equally involved and imperilled in this ques-And are patriotic men in any part of Union prepared, on such an issue, thus madly to invite all the consequences of the forfeiture constitutional engagements? impossible. The storm of phrenzy and faction must inevitably dash itself in vain against the unshaken rock of the constitution. I shall never doubt it. I know that the Union is stronger a thousand times than all the wild and chimerical schemes of social change, which are generated, one after another, in the unstable minds of visionary sophists and in-terested agitators. I rely confidently on the natriotism of the people, on the dignity and self-respect of the States, on the wisdom of Congress, and above all, on the continued gracious favor of Almighty God, to maintain, against all enemies, whether at home or abroad, the sanctity of the constitution and the in-

the sanctity of the Union.


