We, the undersigned, Auditors of Lancaster County, do certify, that we have carefully examined the foregoing account of Charles M. Howell, Esq., Treasurer of said County, and have compared his vouchers with the same, and find there is a baiance in his hands of five thousand, on e hundred and twenty-eight dollars and seventy-nine cents, (\$5123,79.)
In view of our recommendation in last year's Report, rolating to outstanding taxes, it appears Collectors have become still more negligont in collecting or paying over to the Treasurer the outstanding amounts in their several duplicates. They should be more prompt in their payments, and we would, therefore, respectfully recommend, that the County Commissioners urge speedy settlement by all delinquent Collectors.

We have examined the account of Hughs, Gara, Esq., Treasurer of the Board of Prison Inspectors, and find it correct, showing a balance due him by the board of Inspectors of six hundred and fifty-seven dollars and seventy-six cents, (\$657,76.)

We also examined the account of James Dysart, Esq., Treasurer of the Poor and House of Employment of Lancaster County, and find a balance in his hands of two hundred and thirty-seven dollars and seventy-seven counts, (\$237,77.)
