Howell, Esq., Treasurer of said County, and have compared his vouchers with the same, and find there is a balance in his hands of fire thousand, on a hundred and twenty-eight dollars and seventy-nine cents, (3512S,79.)

In view of our recommendation in last year's Report, relating to outstanding taxes, it appears Collectors have become still more negligent in collecting or paying over to the Treasurer the outstanding amounts in their several duplicates. They should be more prompt in their payments, and we would, therefore, respectfully recommend, that the County Commissioners urgs speedy settlement by all delinquent Collectors.
