The gift was well merited, not only for the gentlemanly bearing of the Doctor, but for his antiring advocacy of Democratis men and measures-and particularly the stranuous exertions made during the recent Presidential campaigh. The Doctor was deserving this from his political friends and more too, and we hope Mr. Buchanan in the dispensation of his favors will not overlook the claims of such a fast friend as Dr. Chas Leib. The remains of Wm. T. Sherrard, (who was shot in Kan-

s during a quarrel, by a man named Jones)-passed through this city accompanied by several friends, on their way to Virginia. Sherrard is the man who undertook to pit in Gov. TORONTO, March 12.—The train which left this city this atternoon for Hamilton, ran off the bridge above Hamilton, precipitating the engine, baggage car and two passenger cars into the water. The locomotive and baggage car passed over the bridge in safety, but th two rear cars, containing 120 passengers, fell through. Between sixty and eighty persons are supposed to have been killed on the spot. Among the killed are: Samuel Zimmerman, the well known ban

together with his sister and mother-in-law. Thomas C. Mackin is also reported as killed.
