The lands have been all appraised by commissioners appointed for the purpose, and will not be sold for less than the value thus put upon them by the dovernment Appraisers. One sale will occur at Iowa Point, in Doniphan county, Kansas, beginning on Tuesday, the 5th of May. This sale is for the benefit of the Iowa Tribe. Another sale will occur at Paoli, in Lykins county, Kansas, commencing on Tuesday, the 25th of May, for the confederated bands of Kaskaskias, Peorias, Piankeshaws and Wess. Also another sale at Lecompton, in Kansas, on Tuesday, the 23d of June, for the benefit of the Delaware

For the benefit of the Iowa tribe 95,000 acres will be sold; for the confederated bands 214,000 acres; and for the Delaware tribe 345,000 acres-making it all 655,000 acres.
