Several shots vere fired, and the Mayor and others were seriously injured from pistol shots, stones and bricks. Pnding that the mob was determined to demolish the prison, three of the negroes were delivered up—one on going out of the jail drew a ra-zor that he had in his pocket and cut his own throat from ear to ear; the other two were selzed, and hung up in the Court Yard, when the mob returned to the jail and demanded the fourth negro—the one that turned State's evidence—who was handed over, and hung by the side of the others. Three were hung and one cut his own throat. These wretches first murdered the Joyce family and then burnt the house. One child they did not kill, but burnt it slive

EXTRACT FROM ORDINANCE.

"The Duplicate of water rent shall be as heretofore made out on or before the first day of April, yearly, and the Mayor shall immediately thereafter deliver the same to the City Treasurer, to whom the rent shall be payable at his office.
