Spectron 1. The state may contract debts, to supply eas-ual deficits or failures in revenues or to meet expenses not otherwise provided for: but the aggregate amount of such debts direct and contingent, whether contracted by virtue of one or more acts of the general assembly, or at different periods of time, shall never acceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts shall never acceed seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and the money arising from the creation of such debts shall be applied to the purpose for which it was obtained, or to repay the debts so contracted, and to no other purpose whatever.
