ST. LOUIS, Oct. 5, 1857. We have just passed through another week of gloom and despondency—a week in monetary affairs much worse than the one previous. Upon the receipt of the news of the suspension of the Philadelphia, Washington, Baltimore and other Eastern Banks, it caused a great degree of appre nension and distrust in this city, and which was greatly ncreased by the closing of the doors, on Mondy last, of the panking houses of Darby & Barksdale and John J. Anderson & Co., and on the day following that of Bogy & Miltenber ger. We do not think, however, that there is much money locked up in these concerns, as they were pretty thoroughly drained out before they closed their doors. What these houses intend to do, has not been made public, but we understand from a private source, that one of them proposes to its depositors an extension—to run 3, 6, 9, 12, 15, 18, 21, and 24 months (!). Whether the depositors will come into this arrangement is yet to be seen. It is said by some of the "knowing ones" that all three of these houses are abundantly able to meet their liabilities dollar for dollar,

his we are not prepared to believe, but hope it may be so-The suspension of these private bankers caused a run oon the banking institutions of our city, and they all met their checks promptly in specie funds. This run soon subsided, and a more cheerful tone inspired the business com munity. Up to Thursday night, not a failure had occurred among our merchants or manufacturers, but the aspect before them was truly gloomy, and the indications were after the trials of experience, the people are becoming convinced that the fault is not that many of our largest business firms would be compelled to go to "protest." On Friday we heard rumors of several failures and suspensions, but nothing to corroborate the theory and principle of banks of issue.
