sess the power, but it is our imperative duty to construct such a road. It would be an absurdity to invest a government with the unlimited power to make and conduct war, and at the same time deny to it the only means of reaching and de-feating the enemy at the frontier. Without such a road it is quite evident we cannot "protect" Cali-fornia and our Pacific possessions "against inva-sion." We cannot by any other means transport men and munitions of war from the Atlautic States in sufficient time successfully to defend those re-mites and distant portions of the republic. The dificulties and the expense of constructing a military railroad to connect our Atlantic and Pa-cific States, have been greatly exagerated. And although advantages of this kind, whether postal, commercial, or political, cannot confer constitutional power, yet they may furnish auxiliary arguments in favor of expediting a work which, in my judgment, is clearly embraced within the

in my judgment, is clearly emoraced within the war-making power. For these reasons I commend to the friendly consideration of Congress, the subject of the Pa-cific railroad, without finally committing myself to

any particular route. We are now compelled to pause in our career, and to erritinize our expenditures with the unnest vigilance; and in perform-ing this dnty, I pledge my co-operation to the extent of my constitutional competency. It ought to be observed at the same time that true pub-lic economy does not consist in witholding the me as may be necessary for the common defense. In the pres-ent crisis of the country it is our duty to confine our appropriations to objects of this character, miless in cases where justice to individualis may demand a different course. In all cases ever ought to be taken that the money granted by Congress shall be faithfully and economically applied. Under the Federai Constitution, "every bill which shall have passed the House of Beyresontaives and the Sente shall, hefore it becomes a law," be approved and signed by the President; and, if ne approved' the fresident to read and examine every bill presented to Tim for ap-proval. Unless this be afforded, the Constitution be-comes a dead letter in this particular; and even worse, it becomes a means of deception. Our constituents, seeing the President's approval and signature attached to each act of Congress, are induced to believe that he has ac-tual approve bills a thick day, when, in truth, hothing is, in many cases, more unfounded. From the practice of Congress, such an examination of each bill as the Constitution requires, has been rea-dered impossible. The meast important businges of
