IMPORTANT LAW .- The Act of the 19th of April, 1848, which was in force in Philadelphia and Luzerne counties only, commonly called the Sheriff's Interpleader Act, has recently been extended to the whole State, by an Act of the Legislature. It is almost verbatim a copy of the British Statute 1 and 2 Will. IV., C. 58. § 6, and the Courts of Philadelphia have adopted the English practice under it.
