LIABILITY OF HOTEL KEEPERS .- An important decision has recently been pronounced by Judge Eggleston of Louisiana, in the case of Pope vs, Hall & Hildreth, of the St. Charles Hotel. New Orleans.

The plaintiff put up at the St. Charles Hotel, in November, 1857. While there his room was entered at night, and his watch valued at \$200, and gold coin to the amount of \$145 were stolen. The defendants pleaded, in bar to the suit, public notices posted by them in the rooms and conspicuous parts of the hotel, to the effect that they would not be responsible for money, watches, or other valuables, unless deposited with the clerk.

The Court held that the defendants were liable for any loss, unless occasioned by the force of arms; that their liability was fixed by law, and that they could not limit it by any public notice, defining their responsibility. They have no right to require a traveller to deposit his money, watch, etc., with their clerk. It is their duty to keep honest servants, and exert vigilance over all persons coming into the hotel as guests or otherwise. Judg. ment is accordingly given for plaintiff.

New Grenada.-It has been reported by the Aspinwall correspondent of the New York Times, but on doubtful authority, that the treaty between New Grenada and the United States, had been ratified by the former.
