BEPARATE PR)PD-SALS, sealed and endorsed "Proposals for Navy Supplies." will be received at this Bureau until 9 o'clock, a. m., on WEDN ESDAY, the 20th day of APRIL next, for furnishing and fellvering (on receiving ten days' notice, except, for bissuit, for which-five days' notice shall be given for every twenty thousand pounds required) at the United States navy-yards, at Charlestown, Massachusetts; Brooklyn, New York; and Gesport, Virginia, such quantities only of the following articles as may be required or ordered from the contractors by the chief of this bureau, or by the respective commanding officers of the said navy-yards, adding the. fiscal year ending June 30, 1860, viz:
