Everybody knows, who has lived in the country, what a remarkably cheerful body of men farmers are, how invariably the weather suits them, how sanguine are their anticipations of good crops - in short, to drop the ironical how prone they are to keep up, even to themselves, representations which may tend to raise prices. When we consider the precarious nature of crops, and how a few When we consider the change in the thermometer may destroy the hopes of months, this is natural enough. But the country at large should in all cases know the whole truth, and nothing but the truth.—Evening Bulletin.
