A good story is told of Horace Greeley. He was anxious

to know all about the gold mines, and those Eastern Yankees now in that region, knowing Horace's failure-a good subject to be humbugged and used-played a nice trick upon him. An old Californian miner who has been prossting at Pike's Peak, but very unsuccessfully, and having in his possession about \$400 worth of California gold dust, concluded to *sell* Horace, and if he succeeded the speculators and land sharks, in and around the mines, were to present him with \$100? Thereupon the sharper took his \$100 to gold dust, and planted it upon a claim he had been working on for a month-not averaging ten cents per day. Reported all around that he had struck a rich lead, and invited every body to call and see it, particularly Horace Greeley, who was to be "sold" for a consideration.
