10.—Hay, Straw and Water will be supplied free of charge, for all animals entered for premiums; and grain will be provided at the cost price for those who desire to purchase JUDGES .- The Judges will meet punctually at 11 o'clock on Tuesday morning at the business office, at which time, all vacancies in the list will be filled. All necessary in-structions will then be furnished them, and they will proceed to the discharge of their duties at 1 o'clock of the same day. They will in all cases, where the article or anima

not worthy, withhold a premium, though there be no competition. PREMIUMS —The award of Premiums will be announced on Saturday, and to persons residing out of the county, will be paid at the Secretary's Office on the Grounds, on Saturday the 8th, and to residents of the county, on and after Monday the 18th, by calling on the Treasurer, Col. David W. Patterson, and all money premiums not called for within 60 days, will be considered dona-

tions to the Society.

POLICE.—An efficient police will be employed day and night, and the managers will use all diligence to insure the safety of articles, animals, &c., on exhibition. But in no instance will the Society be responsible for loss or damage, should any occur.
EXHIBITORS—1.—All persons entering articles or animals for exhibition, will be

charged one dollar, except persons entering "Horses for Trial of Speed," who will be charged three dollars. 2.-Exhibitors and necessary attendants upon their Stock and articles, will be furnished with tickets, which will admit them during the continuance of the exhibition 3.—All information relating to the Fair.
