The current was one of great depth, and the balloon went up to a height of three and a half miles without losing it. After reaching that altitude, it took a more easterly course; and he found the current so steady that he believes if he had maintained the altitude of two and a half miles, he could have crossed the ocean in thirty six hours, without using any more ballast than in making an ordinary local ascension.
