MR. STOCKTON'S SECOND SERMON. ·We clip from the Washington correspondence of the Harrisburg Patriot, of the 16th inst., the following notice of the second discourse of the Rev. Thomas H. Stockton in the Hall of the House of Representatives: Washington, April 16th, 1860.

It was announced in the city papers on Saturday last, that the Rev. Mr. Stockton, the present Chaplain to Congress, would preach in the Hall of the House of Representative on the following Sabbath. At about half past ten o'clock on Sunday morning, I wended my way to the Capitol to hear Mr. Stockton, whom I had never had the pleasure of either seeing or hearing. The spacious Hall of the House was crowded with a dense mass of human beings, in which, as usual, the fair sex greatly predominated. At about a quar ter before II o'clock, the tall figure of the Rev. Mr. Stockton emerged from one of the side doors, when he walked to the Clerk's desk and took his seat. No one who sees Mr. S. for the first time can fail to be impress with his somewhat singular appearance. He is about six feet in height, of slender frame. His head is covered with a fine growth of hair of a yellowish white, combed and worn rather long. His face is of a ghastly, sepulchral paleness, with prominent features, which stand out in bold relief, in consequence of the absence of the slightest approach to superfluous flesh.
