vails in reference to the matter. WONDERS OF THE WESTERN ALLEGHENY SLOPE.—The Kanawa (Va.) Republican says: The subterranean wonders of the Western Alleghenian slope continue, from time to time, to be developed, to the astonishment of the intelligent dwellers upon the surface. Near Malden, on the Kanawa river, in the Spring 1844, in boring a salt well, at the depth of 1000 feet, the auger struck the reservoir of gas. The stream of gas that rose to the upper surface was so powerful as to shoot the whole boring apparatus, consisting of one thousand poles, and a sucker, weighing five hundred pounds, into the air like an arrow. The stream of gas is three inches in diameter, and has been blowing up with unabated force, day and night, for sixteen years.
