Every person, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States, or of this State, or of any city or incorporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be dimployed under the Egislative, Executive or Judiciary departments of the State or the United States, or of any city or iscorporated district, and also that every member of Congress, or of the State tagislature, and of the Select and Common Councils of any city, or Commissioner of any incorporated district, is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and no inspector, judge or other officer of any such election shall be eligible there to be voted for.

The Inspectors and Judges of the elections shall meet at the respective places appointed for holding the election in the district, to which they respectively belong before nine o'clock in the morning, and each of said Inspectors shall appoint one Clerk who shall be a qualified voter of euch district.

In case the person, who shall have received the second

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
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
