U. S. Flag Ship Cincinnati off Ft. Henry, Tennessee River Feb. 6, 1852.

The gunboats under my command, the Essex, Commander Porter; the Carondelet, Commander Walker; the Cincinnati, Commander Stembel; the St. Louis, Lieutenant Commanding Paulding; the Conestoga, Lieutenant Commanding Paulding; the Conestoga, Lieutenant Commanding Phelps; the Taylor, Lieutenant Commanding Phelps; the Taylor, Lieutenant Commanding Shirk, after a severe and rapid fire of one hour and a quarter have captured Fort Henry, and have taken Gen. Loyd Tilghman and his staff, with sixty men as prisoners. The surreuder to the gunboats was unconditional, as we kept an open fire upon them until their flag was struck. In half an hour after the surrender, I handed the Fort and prisoners over to Gen. Grant, commanding the army, on his arrival at the Fort in force. The gunboat Essex had a shot in her boilers, and after fighting most effectually for two-thirds of the action, was obliged to drop down the river. I hear several of her men were scalded to death, including the two pilots. She, with the other gunboats, officers and men, fought with the greatest gallantry. The Cincinnati received thirty-one shots and had one man killed and eight wounded, including two seriously. The Fort with 20 guns and 17 mortars was defended by Gen. Tilghman with the most determined gallantry. I will write as soon as possible. I have sent Lieutenant Commanding Phillips, and three gunboats after the rebel gunboats. [Signed]
