THIGTY-SEVENTH CONCRESS -- FIRST SESSION. MONDAY, February 10. A communication was presented to the Sonate to-day, inclosing a report of a meeting of citizens of North Carolina, held at Hatteras, January 10th, in which the right of Mr. Foster to hold a seat in the House as the representaties of the loyal citizens of North Carolina was insisted upon. Mr. Davis pre-sented a petition from the citizens of Maine, asking Congress to drop the negro question and attend to the business of the country i to anstain the President and General McClellan and support the Constitution of the United States. Mr. Wilson introduced an important bill concerning contracts and orders for government supplies. The bill to construct a street railroad from Washington to Georgetown was passed. The report of the Committee of Conference on the bill to raise certain troops in Missouri and Maryland was, after some debate, agreed to, and the bill on the buse unanimonsity passed the Sanate bill

was, after some debate, agreed to, and the bill passed. The House unanimously passed the Senate bill authorizing the issue of ten million dollars in de-mand notes. On motion of Mr. Aldrich it was re-solved that the Secretary of War be requested to furnish his views and opiuions as to the re-organiza-tion of the medical department, in order that the slock and disabled of the army and navy may be kindly cared for. Mr. Crittenden, by unanimous conseut, presented a petition from Philadelphia pro-posing that on the 22d of Pebruary. Washington's "Farewell Address" be read in one of the houses of Congress by the President of the Senate or Speaker of the House, in the presence of both branches, and that the President, the members of the cabinet, er-Presidents or the United States, the judges of the Supreme Court, the officers of the army and navy, and all distinguished citizens be invited to attend; that the proceedings of the day, including the prayer and all distinguished citizens be invited to attend; that the proceedings of the day, including the prayer and the address, be printed in pamphlet form, and largely distributed; that the address, or portions of it, be read at the head of the armies and on ship-board, as the highest incentive to our brave defend-ers. Mr. Crittenden made a few remarks on the potition, and concluded by offering a joint resolution that it be referred to a select committee of five, which was adopted, with an amendment that the Declaration of Independence and Secretary Stan-ton's order to the army after the battle of Mill Spring be read at the same time. The report of the Spring be read at the same time. The report of the Committee on Elections against the prayer of Joseph Segar, asking that he be admitted to a seat in the Segar, asking that he be admitted to a seat in the House as a representative from the first district of Virginia, was taken up, and a speech in favor of adopting the report was made by Mr. Dawes. Mr. Segar spoke in dofense of his claim, and after re-marks by Messrs. Noell and Diven, the subject was postponed until Tuesday. The House concurred in the Seniate's amendment to the bill providing for the purchase of cotton seed, so that \$1,000 could also be expended for tobacco seed. TUESDAY. February 11. Chamber of Commerce, in favor of the immediate passage of the treasury note bill; for the employment of hom-copathic surgeons in the navy; from citizens of Philadelphia, asking that proper steps be taken for the commemoration of Washington's birthday. On motion of Mr. Johnson a joint resolution was adop-ted that the two houses of Congress assemble in the House of Representatives on Washington's birthday the 22d of February, and that the President, the members of the cabinet, the foreign representatives, members of the cabinet, the foreign representatives, the officers of the army and navy, and others, be invited to attend, and that Washington's " Farewell Address" be read. Mr. Summer offered a series of Address<sup>71</sup> be read. Mr. Summer offered a series of resolutions dectaratory of the relations of the United States with certain states, which were laid on the table. Mr. Rice introduced a bill to anthorize the banks of the District of Columbia to issue notes of less than five dollars, which was referred. The Vice-President appointed Mr. Bright; Mr. Henderson on the Post Office Committee, in place of Mr. Bright; and Mr. Wilson (Mo.,) on the Committee on Indian Affairs, in place of Mr. Cowan. The fortification bill was then taken up and amendments adopted apbill was then taken up and amendments adopted appropriating \$560,000 for the harbors of Maine, and \$200,000 tor the fort at the mouth of the Columbia river.
