PRICE OF GOLD. The New York World of Tuesday says :--Gold is selling to-day at 130<sup>‡</sup>, and bankers' ixty day sterling hills at 145. Last year at the corresponding date gold was at par and exchange was  $107\frac{1}{2}$ .
