PENALTY FOR REFUSING TO SERVE WHEN PRAFTED. oct 28 Much curiosity is evinced to know the pen alties under the State and National laws for refusing to serve when drafted. The draft is enforced under an act of Congrees of July 17th, 1862, which states, among other things, that "the President is authorized to make all necessary rules and regulations," in cases where State laws are defective as to the nrolment or execution of the draft. An act of Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed n 1822, (65th section, April 2d.) uses the following language: "Each and every \* \* \* private of the mi-litia who shall have neglected or refused to serve when called into active service in pursuance of an order or requisition of the President of the United States, shall be liable to the pen alties" defined in the Act of Congress of Feb. 28th, 1795, or any other Acts that may thereafter be passed. On reference to the Act of Congress referred to, it will be found to embrace the following points : "Every officer, non-commissioned officer, or the militia who shall fail + rivate i \* shall forfeit a sum not exceeding one year's pay, and not less than one month's pay, to be determined and adjudged by a Court martial \* \* \* ; and such non-commissioned officers and privates shall be liable to be imprisoned by a like sentence on failure of payment of the fines adjudged against them, one calendar month for every twenty five dollars of such fine." It has been decided by the Supreme Court of this State that those who disobey the requisition are not employed in the service so as to be liable to the articles of war, but that they are liable to be tried by a Court martial under the above act.
