When it is remembered that the existing State constitution of Louiei that the existing State constitution of Louisiana is strongly pro slavery, the spirit and purpose of the ruling elements of the Cabinet will be pretty well understood. Mr. Secretary Chase and his Abolition associates in the Administration, and the radical political faction by which they are supported, simply mean, f they can accomplish it, that none of the States committed to the rebellion shall be restored to the Union without being shorn of the institution of slavery.

EXECUTIVE MANSION, Washington, June 10. Messrs. F. E. Mathiot, Bradish Johnson, and Thomas Cottman :--Gentlemen-Your letter, which follows, has

been received and considered :--To His Excellency, ABRAHAM LINCOLN, Presi-

ident of the United States :--The undersigned, a committee appointed by the planters of the State of Louisiana, respect fully represent that they have been delegated to seek of the General Government a full recognition of all the rights of the State as they existed previous to the passage of an ac: of secession, upon the principle of the existence of the State Constitution unimonired, and no legal act having transpired that could in any way deprive them of the advantages conferred by the Constitution. Under this Constitution the State mishes to return to its full allegiance in the enjoyment of all rights and privileges exercised by the other States under the Constitution. With the view of ac complishing the desired object. we further request that your Excellency will, as Commander in-Chief of the Army of the United States. direct the Military Governor of Louisiana to order an election in conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State, on the first Monday of November next, for all State and
