In the case in question the return of the Provost Marshal was that the petitioner had been duly drafted and had come before the Board to claim exemption as the only son of a widowed mother; that his case was heard and his claim disallowed; that he subsequent-ly appeared and reported for duty and receiv-ed his uniform, and asked and obtained leave of absence for a specified time.
