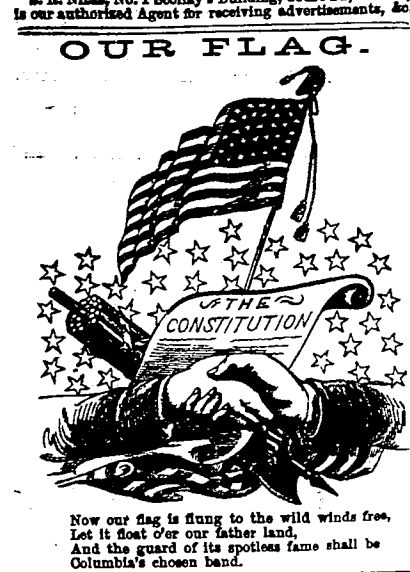

THESEASONS IN THE CABINET.

Some time ago Gen. Blair, one of the Republican members from Missouri in the Federal Congress, brought forward a resolution, and secured the Secretary of the Treasury, Salmon P. Chase, and asked for a committee of investigation, which, we believe, was not granted.

Mr. Blair, a colleague of Gen. Blair, accused the latter of having sold the amount of liquor, while in command in the army, under cover of orders for military supplies, to the amount of \$8,600. A committee, at the request of Gen. Blair, was appointed to investigate the charges, and they reported on Saturday, 23d April, entirely exonerating the General. They say that the original order, signed by Gen. Blair and eight other officers, was for the sum of \$150 or \$175 only, for liquor and cigars; but that the order was subsequently altered by Michael Powers to call for \$8,600 worth for Powers' own pecuniary purposes.
