The Senate refused to postpone the bill at the request of the Radicals by yeas 14, nays 21; but subsequently the morning hour expired. The Tax bill was taken up, and the Senate, by yeas 11, nays 22; but subsequently the morning hour expired. IMPORTANT TO PEACH GROWERS.—The author of "Ten Acres Enough," who is an experienced horticulturist, gives what he has found to be a sure preventative of the borer in peach trees. He first experimented with ten l peach trees that were nearly destroyed by the borer. He bared the roots of the trees and carefully removed all the worms he could find, washed the roots with soap suds and left them uncovered a week to make sure work of any worms that might have escaped his notice. He then applied tar to the diseased parts and to the trunk of the trees two or three inches above ground. The trees recovered their original vigor, and have been fruitful bearers ever since. Tar applied to young trees near the surface of the ground will effectually prevent the borers from molesting them. Coal tar answers the same purpose. Care must be taken not to cover more than a couple of inches above ground.

The next ground of confidence rests in the magnificent army which theneral Grant is massing in Virginia. Its mere numerical proportions are spoken of as something portentous. But not only is the Army of the Potomac strong in its numbers—it is strong in its organization, its commanders, its discipline, its morale. The sweeping manders, its discipline, its morale The sweeping changes made by Grant in the interior of the Army of the Potomac-however much they may have shocked some sensibilities—have all been to the improvement of the army; and no one who knows the provement of the army; and no one who knows une spirit and quality of that army can fail to appreciate the delight and confidence Grant has in it. The next ground of confidence is that the strength of the army Grant has under his command and his unfettered freedom of action will enable him to venture a plan of campaign entirely different from a those several campaigns that have had Richmor their object."

THE PATENT STAMP-SEALING AND POST-MARR PRESERVING ENVELOPE.

The preservation on the letter itself of the POST-MARK and POSTAGE-STAMP, generally destroyed with the deached cover, has long been deemed a matter of the first importance. This desideratum is now triumphantly sectived by this ingenious invention. Many obvious advantages must arise from the general use of this envelope.

First.—Increased Safety by additional sealing; the stamp connecting the envelope and letter securely together; and this is never liable to be omitted, though the sticking of the flap is frequently neglected or imperfectly done.

Scond.—Security against impertinent Intrusion; the letter and envelope being firmly attached by the stamps, and inclosure cannot be inspected even if the flap be clandestinely opened. and inclosure cannot be inspected even if the flap be clandestinely opened.

Third—Safety against Abstraction of Valuable Inclosures. If the flap be left unsealed, or opened with felonius intent, it will be impossible to open the letter and take thence bank notes and drafts without so mutilating the envelope as to insure detection.

Fourth—Security for the free payment of the Postage; as the stamp, when once properly placed in this window, cannot be removed without its destruction.

Fifth—Advantage therefore to the Government; by the effectual destruction of every stamp in its first use.

Sath—Facility to the Post Office Deparations; by a uniform location of the stamp in the upper right hand corner, which is the most convenient position for the Post Office mark. which is the most convenient position for the Post Office mark.

Seventh.—Verification of the Mailing; by securing on the letter itself the legal evidence of the time and place of it being mailed. This has long been esteemed so desirable, that many prudent persons are constrained to dispense with the use of envelopes, that they may have the post mark on the letter; and others take the precaution to plut the envelope again on the letter for identification.

Eighth.—Certainty of the Date and Place on the Letter, which are so frequently omitted by writers in carelessness or hurry.
