Andrew G. Curtin, Governor of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do make this my proclamation, earnestly requesting the people of the Commonwealth, illing to respond to such call of the President, to form military organizations without delay, that they may not be found unprepared to do so. And I do further request that command-

ing officers of all military organizations, which may be formed in compliance with this Proclamation, do forthwith report the condition of their respective commands, that prompt measures may be taken for getting them into the service in case a requisition should be made by the General Government. Such call if made, will be for a term of not less than one hundred days. The troops will be clothed, armed, subsisted and paid by the United States and mustered into the service

Given under my hand and the great seal of the State, at Harrisburg, this eighteenth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and of the Commonwealth the eighty-eighth.
