I will suffer a soldier's death before I give up to a set of dogs that were lying under feather-beds in winter time, while I was standing picket on the frontier many a night when the snow, hail, rain, storm and wind were blowing. Give up to such a set. No, the blood of your son should trickle from his heart first. When a soldier isn't satisfied with the rations given him, and says one word about it not being enough, they send him for ten days to No. 1 jail." "We are not on the boats now, but ar
