To Keep Tires on Wheels.

Hear what a practical man says on this subject: "I ironed a wagon some years ago for my own use, and before putting on the tires I filled the felloes with linseed oil; and the tires have with linseed oil; and the tires nave worn out and were never loose. I ironed a buggy for my own use seven years ago, and the tires are now as tight as when put on. My method of filling the felloes with oil is as follows: I use a fellow with oil is a follows: I use a fellow with our time heater much for the pure long cast-iron heater, made for the purpose; the oil is brought to a boiling heat, the wheel is placed on a stick as to hang in the oil, each felloe an hour, for a common sized felloe. Timber filled with-oil is not susceptible to water, and is much more durable."

Mechanical Progress.

The discovery, in rapid succession, of new elements of national wealth in the hidden recesses of nature has stimulated our enterprising mechanics to new feats of skill, and from their fertile brains and sturdy hands have sprung improved machinery adapted to the wants and requirements of the age. The gold mines of Colorado, the petroleum wells of Pennsylvania and Virginia, and the coal fields of the Middle States, have all demanded an amount of labor which has imperatively called for the construct tion of labor-saving machines, and our ingenious inventors and workmen have not failed to supply the need. The mining of coal was formerly one of the most fatiguing and difficult of labors, involving, both in Europe and this country, an enormous amount of physi-cal wear and tear, but an Englishman, a few years ago, invented a pickaxe which worked horizontally by compres sed air, which cut away the bottom of the vein, and saved the most difficult

and dangerous portion of the manual labor, as well as securing a large quan-tity of coal that before had been wasted. Some ingenious Pennsylvanians have improved on this method by the con-struction of circular saws with a selffeeding apparatus attached, the whole propeled either by horse power or the application of condensed air, which mines the coal more rapidly and with less waste than by the English plan.

The old process of obtaining gold first used is also fast becoming obsolets unused is also fast becoming obsolete unbrought into play. Some of the machin-ery lately shipped to Colorado is of the most ingenious character, and must greatly increase the product of gold by facilitating its extraction.

In the boring of petroleum wells rapid improvements have also been In Burmah the natives dig large deep shafts and men descend bringing up the oil on their backs, involving an amount of toil almost unen-durable. Here all that is avoided by improved implements for boring, steam umps, cast iron tubes for the ascent of the oil and the insertion of "seed bags," which are used to prevent the water which may be struck in boring from mixing with the oil. For the magnitude and value of the yield, oil is more cheaply obtained than almostany article for which we have to penetrate the bowels of the earth, and this is alto gether owing to the mechanical skill ind ingenuity of our people.-Balti
