LANCASTER COUNTY PRISON. FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE INSPECTORS. To the Honorable, the Judges of the Court of Quar-ter Sessions of Lancaster County:
The unders gived, in pursuance of law, sub-mit to the Court the following Report of the Prison for the year ending November 39, 1865:

544 eaving in confinement November 30th,

countries, of which 21 were natives of Germany; 7 of the convicts were under 30 years of age; 9 of the 72 convicts were females; 9 are old offenders, and 63 -re receiving punishment for their first offence; and of the 63 males, but 31 had traces prior to their conviction.

The 72 convicts were occupied as follows.

The 85 kmitting nets; 5 making cigars; 15 making baskets, and 6 making bags; 8 of the 72 could not read, and 17 could not write—a much less proportion of the illiterate than the previous year; 24 of the 72 had never been married, and 5 are widowers; 66 of the convicts were of intemperate habits—a larger proportion of the intemperate than any year since the opening of the Prison, except one.

The whole number of p isoners since the opening of the Prison, September 12, 1851, to November 30, 185, was 8,861—white males, 6,372; white females, 1,111; colored males, 740; colored females, 228.

No epidemic prevailed among the prisoners during the year. The number of cases treated was 184, being in the ratio of 100 cases treated was 184, being in the ratio of 100 cases treated to every 347 prisoners; 166 were cured; 14 relieved, and 5 died.

No landered horse should be employed on any farm, or be permitted to work on any road, or even to pasture in any field. Great as is the danger to well horses from coming in contact with a giandered horse, it is even worse for the man who attends such an animal. In Spooner's Youatt on the Horse we find the following: "The contagious character of glanders is very well known, and not only is it so with regard to the horse, but it is capable of being communicated to the human be. ng; and, indeed, there have been many deaths from this cause, and most horrible deaths they are. It is generally by means of some cut or ab-usion which comes in contact with the glandered matter, that the infection is communicated. The utmost caution should, therefore, be exercised by the attendants; and it is almost unpardonable to keep glandered horses any length of time for the sake of their work."

The cases are now becoming far too numerous in which the groom attending to glandered horses becomes infected, and too often dies. It was only a few days ago we heard of such acase in this city. It was that of Mr. Patrick Kelly, residing on the corper of shippen and Chestinut streets. He was doctoring a glandered horse and the animal threw back his head and case in this city.
