issue of legal tender paper currency, for there is now no "war necessity." Any further issue or use of them as a conveni-ence would be a great wrong to the entire creditor class of the community, and a sure impoverishment of all those who are de-pendent upon fixed incomes. These things being true, with the uncertainty of confir-mation by the Supreme Court of the con-stitutionality of the law, does not good policy and wisdom invite to the di-use of this questionable currency? Judge Woodward says, very emphati-cally, that he does not believe that Con-gress has any Constitutional power to make greenbacks a legal-tender, and, hav-ing filled the office of this fustice of this Commonwealth, he is certainly no mean authority; but, so far as the Courts have decided otherwise, he felt bound to respect the act as Constitutional; and if Congress had the power to make the law, it was equally binding on all classes of credi-tors, public as well as private.
