Be it enacted, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Caro-lina, now met and sitting in General As-sembly, and by the authority of thesame. SECTION 1. That from and after the pas-sage of this bill it shall not be lawful for any party or parties, engaged in any busi-ness, calling or pursuit, for the earrying on of which a license or charter is required by law, Municipal, State, Federal or otherwise, to discriminate between persons, on account of race, color, or previous condition, who shall make lawful application for the bene-fit of such business, calling or pursuit. SEC. 2. Any party so discriminating shall be considered as having violated this act, and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$1,000, or imprison-ment for not less than \$1,000, or imprison-SEC. 3. No act of incorporation shall be conferred upon any organization the rules and regulations of which contain features not compatible with the provisions of this
