Deputy Commissioner of Internal Revenu says that a dealer in tobacco is a perso whose business it is to sell or offer for si manufactured tobacco, snuff or cigars, persen, therefore, whose business it is sell, or offer for sale, cigars, is regarded a dealer in tobacco, and if his annual sales exceed \$100 he is liable to a special tax as exceed \$100 he is liable to a special tax as such. A peddler is a person who travels from place to place selling goods. A person, therefore, who peddles cigars, is not only a dealer in tobacco, but also; a peddler, and is consequently liable to the special taxes upon both. A person, however, who is simply the agent of a manufacturer or dealer, and who travels as such, taking with him samples of cigars, which he does not sell, but upon which he solicits orders for his employer, from whom he receives a stipulated salary, is not regarded as a peddler or dealer in tobacco.
