HOW to Vote if Not Registered. Every native or naturalized citizen who has resided in Pennsylvania one year, or in case of removal and return, six months, and within the election crowds in country villages. district ten days preceding the day of election, and who has paid a State of County tax within two years, can vote at the coming election. If any such person is not registered, he can make affidavit of the above facts before a Justice of the Peace, or before the election officers on the day of election.

Blanks have been furnished to the election officers, and they are bound to be the "roosters and pinchers." give every unregistered man a chance to prove his right to vote.


