within the city limits properly with streets
and alleys, conforming to the general plan
of the city. If authority be given by Act of
Assembly a commission could be appointed
to do this, assessing the damages and filling
a draft in the office of the Recorder of Lanitaster county, which would be notice to ail.

be paid, and the street or alley given to
public use. Unless some such plan be
