THE LOSS OF THE ONEIDA rilling Account by One Who Went Down With the Ship-A Miraculous scape--Gallant Conduct an Heroic Death of Lieuten-ant Commander Stewart.

We are permitted to copy the following interesting extracts from a letter written to his sister by Mr. W. W. Crowninshield, the clerk of Captain Williams, of the United States steamer Oneida. The letter was written without any view to publication, but the deep interest in the subject makes it of special importance and value: YOKOHAMA, Japan, January 29.
