Planting and Cultivating Sweet Potatoes.

A correspondent writes to the Cour When Should Corn Be Planted? an from Burlington, N. J. try Gentleman, from Burlington, N. J. the method of raising sweet potatoes in that State. It is as follows: BY THE EDITOR.

This is a question upon which farmers differ somewhat, but the weight of audiffer somewhat, but the weight of authority seems to favor planting about the 10th of May. Some farmers make it a point to plant as early as possible generally in April. We have been informed that several farmers in Lancaster township, south of Lancaster city, planted corn this year in the beginning of the second week in April. Those farmers seem to take a pride in being

It is true that land is not only of the best quality, but is among the very earliest in this county. It contains large quantities of calx (lime therefore being warmer, admits of planting crops earlier in Spring, and ripen them sooner. There are advantages, as them sooner. There are advantages, as well as disadvantages in early planting, but we think there is no advantage in planting so extremely early. The advantages claimed by the advocates of early planting are that when it is done they can attend more conveniently to other work; that they can finish cultivating it in good season, so as not to interfere with making hay; and that it ripens earlier, and can be husked and housed earlier. The advocates of later planting claim that their method will on an average produce larger crops.

When planted very early, corn is a long time coming up, and if the ground is wet as well as cold a large portion of it frequently rots, and does not come up at all. This necessitates re-planting wherever it has failed to come up, and hence it becomes irregular in forwardness. It also, if the Spring is cold and wet, frequently comes up quite yellow and sickly-looking, and makes but little growth before the weather and ground have become warn, while that planted later comes up green and vigorous, and grows right ahead, soon catching up with the early-planted, and maturing fully as early, without the farmer lawing the vexatious trouble of re-planting a portion.
