SOCIETY READY TO GREET SIR HORSE NEXT WEEK

Boxes and Parking Spaces to Be Filled With Members of Smart Set From Various Cities on Monday.

Soclety is looking forward to its first important event in the opening of the 20th annual exhibition of the Bryn Mawr Horse Show Ansociation, which marks the autumnal social season for Philadelphia. The event will begin on the Polo Grounds at Bryn Mawr on Monday and will continue through the week.

An especially interesting accompanying feas ture of the exhibit will be the first annual Bryn Mawr Hound Show, which begins Tuesday and extends through four days. This side event is the first exhibition especially for fox hounds and beagles ever held in this country and is attracting national attention among huntsmen. Hunt clubs from Massachusetts, Vermont, New York, Virginia and Maryland have entered their packs.

Since 1910 the horse show has extended through five days, but this year the exhibit has been extended a day and 35 new classes have been added. Heavy draft horses are being exhibited for the first time at Bryn Mawr. Addition of this class is in recognition of the efforts of landowners in suburban Philadelphia to improve the breeds of this useful type of horseffesh.

But the Bryn Mawr show has been since its beginning primarily an exhibition of hunting horses. The showing of harness horses, saddle horses, hackneys, ponles and draft horses had always been regarded by the patrons of the exhibit as of secondary importance, although keen contests always develop among these entries.

The abandonment of the Madison Square Garden horse show in New York this year on account of the unsettled conditions caused by the European war, is regarded by local horsemen as a factor that will increase the importance of the Bryn Mawr exhibit, socially as well as in other respects.

From a show of one day's duration held on the terrace at the Bryn Mawr Hotel and attended by about 250 persons, 29 years ago, the annual event has increased in importance until today its ribbons are the most coveted of any show in the country. Its average daily attendance is between 4000 and 5000.

This year prizes aggregating \$5000 in value will be awarded in the various classes. The most valuable prize for hunters is the Radnor Challenge Cup, valued at \$250, which event also carries a sweepstake of \$100.

The Bryn Mawr Challenge Cup for harness horses is valued at \$250 with sweepstakes added. and the challenge cup for the best team of three hunters, given by W. Hinckle Smith, 18 worth over \$300. A total of 413 ribbons will be awarded in the 99 classes.

Waring, Plainfield, N. J., saddle horses and ponies under saddle: Henry V. Colt, Genessee, N. Y., F. S. Von Stade, New York, Fletcher Harper, Millbrook, N. Y., hunters and jumpers; Joseph La Rocque, Bernardsville, N. J., draft horses.
