TELLS THE SENATE DEMOCRATS BROKE PLATFORM PLEDGES

Jones, of Washington, Says the President May Explain Party's Shortcomings in Classical Diction.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—Senator Jones, Republican, of Washington, vigorously attacked the Democratic administration in the Senate today, discussing its record since March 4, 1913.

"Four platform pledges were made to the people of Alaska and the District of Columbia," said Senator Jones, "that their offices should be filled by bona fide residents. This promise has been repeatedly and flagrantly broken."

"When we explain, if we ever do," continued Senator Jones, "the President, in classical diction, will felicitate the people upon the things done by his party. The mind treatment will be given. The jobless man, the marketless man and the bankrupt business man will be told in all seriousness that they are only in a 'psychological' state and to be of good cheer."

Senator Jones said that the Democrats had promised to revise tariff and had done it with disastrous results to the country, especially to the farmer.

"Your platform declared for an amendment to the Constitution limiting the President to one term," said Senator Jones, "but you have done nothing toward fulfilling that promise."

"Your platform denounced the appropriations made by the Republicans as lavish and demanded a return to simplicity and economy. The last appropriations amounted to \$25,796,482, exclusive of the river and harbor appropriations, while the appropriations made by the Democratic Congress for the present fiscal year, exclusive of the river and harbor appropriations, amount to \$1,085,408,777."

"Your platform declared that every American citizen residing or having property in a foreign country must be given full protection of the United States Government. But you have seen American citizens wantonly murdered and their property destroyed, and the only suggestion of relief to those surviving was to leave their homes and come back to this country. Apparently the Government could afford no protection to its citizens beyond its borders."

SOCIETY BURGLAR'S HOME A VERITABLE TREASURY OF GEMS

Young Wife Learns for First Time From Police Nature of Her Husband's Trade.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The home of Herbert J. Eaton, who was shot by detectives while fleeing after he had robbed the apartment of Mrs. Arthur E. Pike, of 619 Riverside Drive, is a veritable jewelry store, according to the police, for they announced that Mrs. Eaton, wife of the prisoner, has turned over a huge amount of loot which she discovered in odd corners of her home. Eaton himself is in the Knickerbocker Hospital dangerously near death from a bullet which pierced his lungs, the doctors state.

In giving up the loot, the young wife stated that she had ever believed her husband to be exemplary, he having seemed to prefer to stay home when it came to the question of going out anywhere for the evening.

The loot turned over by Mrs. Eaton to the police was in three small chambray bags which she had discovered under a bed, and they all contained jewelry.

The list of valuables includes three gold chain bracelets, two of which were set with diamonds; a wedding ring, engraved on the inside "Clara to Sigmund, May 19, 1907"; a gold seal ring with a green stone, with the initials "S. R."; a gold watch encircled with two rows of pearls; a gold-plated cross which opened, revealing a list of saints, and three stickpins, two gold band bracelets, a string of amber beads and eight rings.

Meanwhile the police were making more sensational discoveries of Eaton as an adept at the art of robbing women of jewelry in a "gentlemanly" fashion.

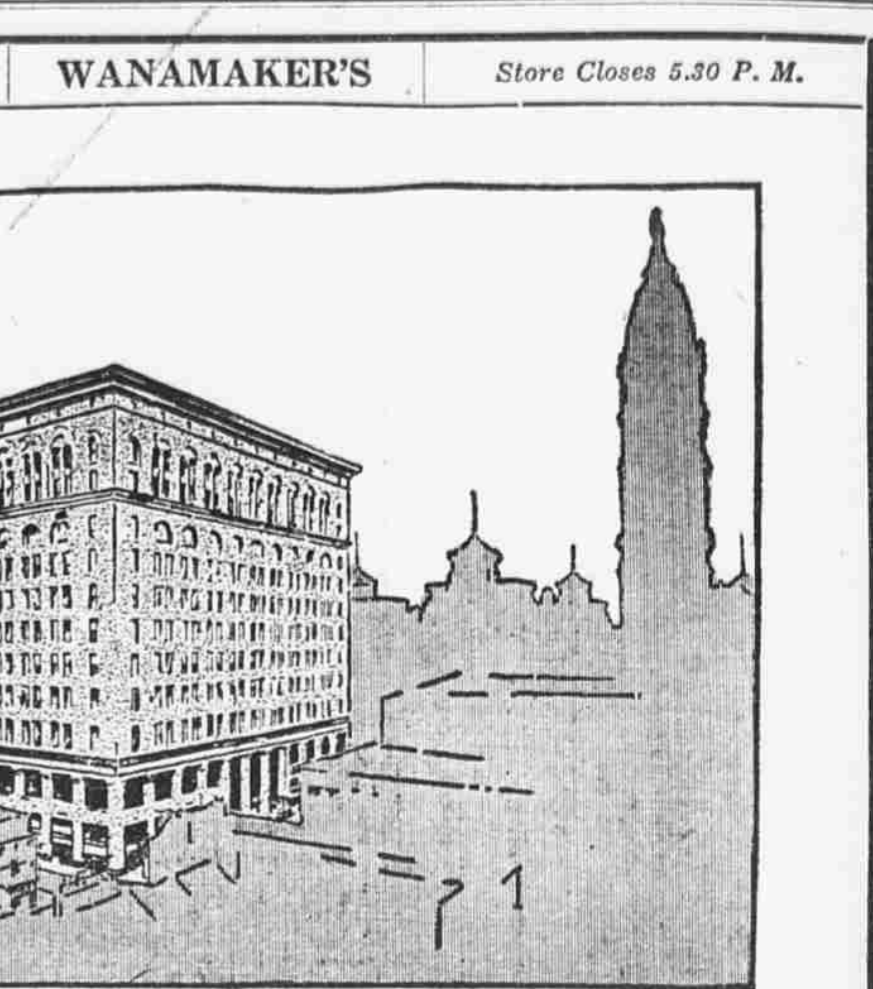
A search of his apartment, which seems to have been a storehouse of stolen property—all unknown to his trusting young wife—also cleared up the mystery of a \$15,000 jewelry robbery in August, 1913. The search was conducted by Acting Captain Alonso Cooper, of the Fourth branch, and Detectives Efoley and Horan. Jewels which answered to the description of those stolen from Miss Marie Kohn, declared to be the daughter of a wealthy French merchant, and who is now in Paris, were uncovered by the captain and his detectives in a search of the Eaton apartment. Miss Kohn lived at 690 Madison avenue when the jewelry, valued at \$15,000, was taken in August, 1913.

The detectives found a bird-shaped diamond brooch hidden under a false bottom of a fern dish suspended from a chandelier. The brooch contained 150 small diamonds. Behind a picture on the wall was found a garnet ring with an intricate design engraved in the stones. Under a rug in a corner of the living room they found an opal pendant surrounded by 19 large diamonds and attached to a gold woven chain.

Then they went at all the rooms with the closest scrutiny, and were rewarded by finding fastened behind the mirror on a dresser a pearl locket, set with several pearls of unusual size.
