WHAT MILADY WEARS Smart Gowns and Coat Suits Worn For Shopping by Women of Fashion During the Week.

With cooler weather the coat suit is seen more often, and, in spite of the many changes in style and cut, dark blue seems to predominate. Mrs. James Potter is wearing an extremely good-looking tailored suit of dark blue broadcloth, which is cut on plain lines. The skirt is made in walking length and is finished with a wide hem. It is very narrow about the foot. The coat is hip length and is fastened with three large buttons. Mrs. Potter's hat is a sailor model of black tulle velvet, which has a narrow silver and black band about the crown and is trimmed with a bunch of tall gaura feathers.

Dark blue broadcloth has also been chosen by Miss Edwina Elkins Bruner. The coat is a semifitting Eton jacket, and the skirt has a fitted overdress, which is rounded at the front and reaches below the knee at the back. Miss Bruner wears a perfectly plain, high-crowned, silk beaver sailor hat with this suit.
